## SPECIAL GUEST FROM AMSA

## Application for New Service Station at 75-79 Queen St. Berry

Still No Decision yet on the application for modifications to the existing development consent (as at 19-4-2023)

Council ran a Community Briefing Webinar on this application on Tuesday 18-4-2023 where there were over 250 community members logged in to participate.

At the conclusion of the webinar staff outlined what the next steps were. This included the fact that due to the very high interest in this application it had been "called in" – which means staff will make a recommendation to the full elected Council. Those Councillors will vote on the decision taking into account the staff reports, the staff recommendations, the appropriate legislation and the hundreds of community submissions.

During the Briefing Council staff highlighted some particular submissions and questions – from community groups and individuals. The staff paid tribute to the detail and hard work put into those hundreds of submissions and advised that this was an important part of their community consultation.

They are anticipating a briefing to Council and then a vote on the Council floor by the elected Councillors reasonably shortly now. Until such time as that happens staff will continue to take and consider every submission – this is their usual practice. There was some suggestion that submissions may be closed off in a week or so following the publication of the recorded community briefing we attended on 18-4-2023. You should be able to access that recorded briefing using Councils web site.

You may still be able to make your submission by going to: https:// www.shoalhaven.nsw.gov.au/Home choose DA Tracking; and enter DS22/1239 this will take a little time to load as there are a large number of documents and submissions.

## BANK BRANCH FOR BERRY ON THE HORIZON

## **A BERRY ICON**

The **BERRY DONUT VAN** is one of the most recognised landmarks not only in Berry, but along the NSW South Coast. One only has to mention Berry to someone from Sydney or Melbourne and the first thing they will remark upon is the Berry Donut Van! For nearly 60 years the van has served the many travellers who visit or pass through Berry and also the many locals who are after a coffee and some of those delicious cinnamon donuts.

The van itself, a restored 1902 railway van, was towed as a caravan around Australia for a year by husband and wife, Colin and Shirley London, as a travelling purveyor of the holey snack, before they decided to settle in the township of Berry. Here they decided to market it as The Donut Van and so they created and designed this unique business, opening up their doors in 1964. The van today is the original van still, having had a few face lifts and no doubt, internal changes. At the time, Colin and Shirley purchased the home that is behind the van, with the latter being set up in their front yard, right on the Highway, as it was then.

At one time the business was open 24 hours, and so the famous Berry Donut Van was practising 'Stop, Revive, Survive' long before the Road and Traffic Authority's program. Locals can remember calling in at the Donut Van in the evening, after attending a dance or the movies.

Berry Museum 135 QUEEN STREET BERRY Colin London had the business until 1995 when it was offered up for Public Auction in September that year.

The present owner is about the 4th owner/ operator. Hands may have changed over that time, but the queues remain for good reason – it's a doughnut that's a destination-and the popular well known business is still going strong. Locals will remember how in early 2020 the Donut Van's 'Covid 19 spaced' queue reached right down to the Great Southern Hotel on the corner of Alexandra Street. Not even Covid could stop its fame and popularity.

## BEHIND CURTAINS, THE STORY OF

Lecture by Leslie Primo

The nude is still seen in our modern age as the pinnacle of creative artistic perfection, but throughout the course of art history the notion of the perfect body and consequently gender has been constantly reshaped and redefined. This lecture will look at the continuing fascination with representation of the body in sculpture and in painting across the ages. This span of time will encompass iconic works within this lecture by Botticelli, Raphael, Titian, Bernini, Degas, Renoir and Velazquez, to name but a few.

Leslie Primo holds a BA in Art History and an MA in Renaissance Studies from Birkbeck College, University of London. He gives lectures at the National Gallery, the National Portrait Gallery and the City Literary Institute and has presented a series of talks at the National Maritime Museum and the Courtauld Institute. His book, The Foreigners that Invented British Art: From Renaissance to Enlightenment will be

published by Thames and Hudson in Spring 2023.



# Out-Foxed

The NSW NPWS estimate there are around 10,000 foxes in the Shoalhaven.

Foxes in the wild live for about 3 to 4 years and are mostly nocturnal and hunt solitarily, Individuals pair up during the breeding season between July and October. Every night in Australia it is estimated that well over 1 million native animals are killed by foxes and feral cats.

In the Shoalhaven, the fox is implicated in the local extinction of the Eastern Quoll, Southern Brown Bandicoot, Red-necked Pademelon, Parma Wallaby and the Bush-stone Curlew. It is also implicated in the decline of the Spotted-tailed Quoll, Long-nosed Potoroo, Koala, and Brush-tailed Rock Wallaby.

In addition to preying on, and outcompeting our native fauna, foxes spread weeds such as Bitou Bush, Blackberry, Olives and Lantana. They also spread a range of diseases such as sarcoptic mange to wombats and Neospora - a protozoa that causes abortions in cattle. Fox predation of ground-dwelling mammals and birds is linked to increases in fire risk across eucalypt forests, due to the reduced processing and turnover of ground litter.

This RAP sheet provides ample motivation for landowners to actively control foxes on their properties, if not for the ever-present legal obligation to do so.

For some however, the use of chemicals, such as 1080 baits poses humane issues, and/or their properties are too small (less than

5 hectares) to deploy baits. In these contexts, the use of a cage trap is a real option to consider. Berry Landcare owns two cage traps which are available for loan. You will need: gloves, subterfuge, replacement meat lures every 5 to 14 days, your presence to monitor the trap when set, and a person with a gun licence to dispatch any captured ferals.

#### Council webinar on proposed 24/7 convenience store / fuel outlet

At least 265 people logged into the Residents Briefing Webinar on the proposed service station on Tuesday 18 April, including all councillors. The presentation was chaired by Director City Development James Ruprai, supported by Council planning staff. Some initial technical teething problems were overcome and the designated planner Elizabeth Downer provided an informative presentation. At the time of the presentation, the legal opinion provided by the Forum in conjunction with the Preserve Berry's Character group was still under review. Council has now received almost 300 submissions relating to this application, a record number as far as we're aware. The main issues raised related to the legality of the modification, permissibility and characterisation, incompatibility with the village/heritage character of the surrounding area, impact of additional traffic, hours of operation and the signage.

Other issues raised related to the fence, the car wash location and hours of operation, impact on neighbouring properties, illumination, potential for future liquor licence, relocation of bus stop, no EV charging, impact on Donut van entrance and the lack of stormwater drainage.

The application was called in previously, which means the staff recommendation will be considered by all councillors at a future Council meeting. Residents who made submissions will be advised of meeting details in due course.

#### Acquisition of OTR service stations by Viva Energy

Viva Energy, a major Australian fuel supplier and the operator of Shell service stations, has announced its intention to acquire South Australian convenience retail business OTR for \$1.15 billion from Peregrine Corporation.

Viva acquired the Coles Express network for \$300 million in September and is seeking to become Australia's leading convenience retailer. The deal is subject to regulatory approvals from the Foreign Investment Review Board (FIRB) and the Australian consumer watchdog.

Viva CEO Scott Wyatt said OTR would become Viva's 'flagship convenience brand' once it replaces the Coles Express brand, with a pathway to 1,000 stores nationally.

The introduction of OTR's superior convenience offering, including quick serve restaurants, will help revolutionise the diversity and attraction of our retail offering. As our stores increasingly become retail destinations, we expect convenience earnings will grow and reduce our dependency on traditional fuels."

OTR founder Yasser Shahin will be retained by Viva to support the existing group and transition the business. He is one of the three Shahin brothers that run Peregrine Corporation. Together, they are considered South Australia's richest family, with a combined net worth of \$2.27 billion according to The Australian's recently published Rich List.

#### SUSTAINABLE BERRY AUTUMN - WINTER 2023

**BUILDING A RAT-PROOF COMPOST BIN:** Adding compost to your garden beds will improve the biodiversity and fertility of the soil. An ideal ratio for a healthy compost is around 25-35:1 Carbon to Nitrogen. Carbon is found in drier or 'brown; items; paper towels or bags, newspaper, torn up pizza boxes, fallen leaves, chipped twigs and branches, etc. Nitrogen is found in the wet or 'green' items; kitchen scraps, lawn clippings, weeds, etc. Bacteria that break down compost need carbon for energy, and nitrogen to grow proteins.

Traditionally compost is made in open heaps, with layering of materials and turning, to assist the breakdown of matter. From experience, that is an open invitation to rats. A compost bin is a compact solution, and one that can be effectively rat-proofed. When setting up a compost bin on ground, a couple of layers of wire mesh laid below the bin, with a base layer of decomposing leaves, will keep rats out but allow worms in. A ring of bricks around the perimeter of the bin further deters rats. I have yet to have a rat in the bin when I use these steps. I have two bins on the ground that I alternate, and have added a tumble bin, which is the first stop for kitchen and garden waste. While expensive, tumble bins accelerate the breaking down process, and when semi full, the contents can be transferred to the bin on ground.

**AUTUMN LEAVES:** The practice of burning autumn leaves or sending them to landfill should absolutely be a thing of the past. It is a waste to miss out on this valuable (but free) annual addition to the soil's biology. If fallen leaves aren't in danger of smothering plants below, retaining leaves in place is a good way to add organic matter to the soil, and suppress weeds. Left in place on marginal parts of your garden, autumn leaves build healthier soil, and give food and shelter to over-wintering insects and wildlife. If you have an excess of fallen autumn leaves, they can be put aside to add to your compost bin as needed. Alternatively, you may choose to make a Leaf Mould compost enclosure, which is a simple process that mimics fallen leaves in a forest.

Lawns become dormant in the colder weather and may fare poorly under a heavy carpet of dead/wet leaves. Leaves can be mulched in situ when you mow, thereby adding to the lawn's fertility. If you need to clear areas, use a rake. Leaf blowers are noisy, use fossil fuels, annoy the neighbours, and should only be a last resort.

## **Alligator Weed Alert**

Alligator Weed (Alternanthera philoxeroides) is recognized as a weed of national significance. It is possible the weed, native to South America, was introduced into Australia around the Second World War, and is already impacting crop and turf farming in the Lower Hunter and Sydney Basin regions. Personnel from Shoalhaven Council have been inspecting rural areas and properties to determine the presence and/or extent of this weed in recent weeks.

**APPEARANCE** Alligator weed is a summer growing, vigorous perennial herb. It has small white papery flower heads 8-10 mm in diameter, generally appearing from November to March. The flowers grow at the end of short stalks, which rise from the leaf axils. Alligator weed has leaves occurring in opposite pairs along the stems. The stems are hollow, and can grow to 10 m long on water. The weed has an extensive root system; roots can grow to more than a metre in length, allowing for survival of the plant during extended dry periods.

Alligator weed is capable of growing in waterways, flood plains, and on poorly drained land. In waterways it can completely blanket the surface, impede water flow, and displace native flora. It is tolerant to 30% seawater. The weed mat can become dense enough to support a person's weight.

HOW IT SPREADS In Australia the plant does not produce viable seeds. However, new plants can occur at any stem or root node. Breaks in stems, either by natural or man-made disturbances, create new plants. Movement of turf, soil and dredged material can further spread the weed. **CONTROL** Alligator Weed is extremely difficult eradicate, is able to tolerate many herbicides, and cannot safely be composted. It should never be sent to landfill or green waste for disposal. It may be dried out and incinerated. Weed mats should covered in place to keep out



light, for 6 to 12 months, checking edges for creeping stems.

It was said that it was to speed up Development Applications but the result is that the community hear nothing about some applications until they have been approved. In fact, Council hear nothing about these Applications until they have been determined by the private assessors. This robs the community of an opportunity to scrutinise and have a direct input (ie lodge a Submission under the DA Tracking process) on what is happening in their neighbourhood or town. This has proven contentious and upsetting for many community members. We have taken to drawing attention to CD's in this way so our community understand why they may have heard nothing about the development previously.

## Gmelina leichhardtii - White beech

In 2015, while collecting seeds to propagate, a student discovered a White Beech seed germinating in the leaf litter under the parent tree.

In 2017, the small seedling was planted in the tree orchard area now known as The Habitat Forest.

The White beech seedling is powering along and is now about 2 ½ metres tall. While it will be many years before it bears fruit, the parent tree fruited again this year

The parent tree in the school grounds has grown straight and tall to compete for light. If grown in a more open space, this

ornamental feature tree would develop a shady canopy without excessive height.

White beech is a tree to be valued, and by every standard it will enhance any large garden or park space.

## A FEW FACTS ABOUT THE WHITE BEECH

- White beech has a protracted cycle of flowering, pollination and seed germination.
- Carpenter bees pollinate the flowers.
  A mature tree bears fruit every 2-4 years
- A mature tree bears fruit every 2-4 years. The fruiting is prolific if conditions are favourable.
- The ripe purple fruits contain a capsule with 4 seed chambers, but not all seeds will be viable.
- Seeds can take from 6 months to 2 years to germinate.

## Have your say on bush fire risk in the Shoalhaven

#### Wednesday April 19, 2023

Fire agencies and land managers are developing a Bush Fire Risk Management Plan for the Shoalhaven area, and the community is invited to participate in this process by having a say on how bush fire risk is managed.

The plan will map and describe the level of bush fire risk across an area and sets out treatment strategies to reduce the risk of bush fires and better protect the community over five years.

The Have Your Say survey is the way the Shoalhaven Bush Fire Management Committee gathers feedback from the community to assist with the risk planning.

"Bush fires can affect our lives, homes, livelihoods and communities with devastating consequences," said Shoalhaven Bush Fire Risk Management Committee Executive Officer, RFS Superintendent Matthew Reeves. "Community input will provide valuable insights that enable the Bush Fire Management Committee to prioritise places, spaces, resources and assets that the community hold of most value", said Superintendent Reeves.

All residents and landholders residing in the region are encouraged to participate in the short, 5 minute survey on how bush fire risk is managed over the next 5 years.

## **BUSINESS IN BERRY IN APRIL 2023**

We're definitely seeing some businesses in Berry struggle along with the rest of the community with cost of living pressures- rising interest rates, whether it's for business loans or in their personal life with their mortgages. People are definitely starting to feel the squeeze. And it's making businesses more conservative and cautious about unnecessary expenditure and reviewing the main headline costs for their businesses.

Businesses generally have been coming back strongly after the pandemic, however the extraordinary boom in regional tourism has definitely tempered. So we're hearing that it's a much more competitive market for holiday accommodation operators now- with bookings happening very close to the time. But for the restaurants and hospitality venues, really the key issue is still access to staff. The rental crisis in the region means that for those essential workers and people on the lower awards, it's increasingly difficult to find or afford a house to rent and work in the area. And that's definitely having an impact on the availability of staff for tourism and hospitality businesses.

On a positive note, the increasing return of international tourists, and people's ability to work from anywhere, means that we are seeing an increase in midweek or extended travel. Over Easter there are plenty of people wanting to bring their families down for the school holidays, but work while they're here. And it's really great to start to see independent international tourists popping up again in the town looking to be able to indulge in all of the lifestyle experiences that Berry has got to offer. In terms of general trends that we are observingthere is an explosion of creative tourism with the opening of the new Bundanon gallery in the area. We are seeing plenty of demand for paddock-to-plate experiences that capitalise on the regions agricultural offerings. The nature and adventure travel market continues to grow as people seek better connections with the great outdoors. And there is a pleasing increase in people seeking authentic indigenous cultural experiences as part of their itinerary. Plus I couldn't not mention the incredible drawcard to town which is the new Boongaree Nature Playground with its incredible pump track and skate bowl- the place is a major drawcard for the town and a kids and parents paradise on weekends

For me as the owner of a coworking business in town, people are wanting to make sure that when they are on holidays, they're still able to keep in touch with their jobs and work remotely. We never used to have any kind of holiday visitors as part of our membership base, where now that's a big part of what we do. That feels very connected to a post-covid, future of work mega trend.

And from my position as President of the Chamber of Commerce. I think that the issue

which is really starting to bite for businesses is the last few years outsized increase in rents. For many local businesses still carrying debt from COVID lockdowns, the unaffordability of rent is starting to bite and vacancies are increasing. There is a concerning trend for long term businesses just shutting their doors and walking away. This if it continues will see empty shopfronts which would be a terrible look for town if the new generation of landlords don't respond to the changed economic conditions with more reasonable rent increases.

Plus with the rise in trade and hospitality wages, combined with the impact of staffing shortages, a number of venues are just not being able to trade as often as they would like to. These are the sort of structural challenges which businesses are facing.

As a general rule, Berry is a thriving and growing treechangers mecca of a town. We are the gateway to the best of the South Coast and with all of the bypasses and roadworks of the last few years- we are closer and closer to leaping within the magical 2hrs from Sydney ring.

Tourists have always been essential to the lifeblood and culture of this place and with fresh blood and new ideas arriving all the time, the diversity of experiences for them is increasing.


