Draft Heritage Shoolhaven Strategy on public exhibition

A document used by Council to help guide planning and management of local heritage projects and supports Council to apply for government funding, is now on public exhibition.

The draft Shoalhaven Heritage Strategy 2025 is a public policy that assists Council's applications to the NSW Government for funding opportunities to help deliver heritage projects and other heritage initiatives across the city.

The strategy is prepared with consideration for best practice advice from the NSW Government, including the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage and the Heritage Council of NSW.

Since its initial adoption, the strategy has been updated numerous times to align with Council's contemporary priorities for heritage management. As a matter of standard practice, public policies must also be reaffirmed within 12 months of the election of a new Council.

The draft Shoalhaven Heritage Strategy 2025 introduces specific recognition of the foundational importance of Aboriginal Cultural Heritage and the need for this to be reflected in planning and development decisions.

There is also a raft of minor changes to the document, including the removal of references to certain projects or undertakings that are not currently Council priorities, such as the appointment of a heritage advisor within

While no community engagement is legislatively required as part of the review process, due to community interest, Council resolved on 12 August to publicly exhibit the draft strategy.

The draft document will be publicly exhibited on Council's Documents of Exhibition webpage for 28 days from Wednesday 24 September until 5pm, Friday 24 October 2025.

The period for responses may have just passed but often they will accept late submissions if they are submitted prior to the staff Report to Council being completed.

LIFE FOR LOCAL WOMEN IN THE EARLY DAYS

Early European women settlers survived floods, fire, illness and childbearing – women bore their children at home, often with little help. Dorothy Edwards was one of six children and daughter to one of the earliest settlers. In the 1940s, when she was nearly 90 years old, wrote about her father who took up 50 acres in 1863:

"At first the land was very heavily timbered forest and brush land... Father's first job was to get a shelter put up for us to live in which consisted of slabs and a bark roof and earthen floor. The hut completed, we settled down to a life of hard struggle and toil."

Alexander Berry, not long after he settled the area said:

"The district was almost completely barricaded with impassable brush".

Violet Glague, in about 1912, wrote of her childhood:

Mother had her own method of treating sick children. Sore throats were treated with a little Kerosene on Sugar. Tummy upsets, a good dose of Castor Oil. Cuts and abrasions were soaked in Condy's Crystals. Once a week we were all given a drink of Senna Tea,

and if we had pimples, Sulphur and Treacle were given".

Over time as conditions improved domestic life in the bush passed slowly for women. Gardening, music, needlework, books and social interaction

with neighbours helped break the monotony.

'Miss Betsy' (Betsy Stewart) who lived in old "Mananga" where she and her brother ran the earliest Post Office liked to keep up appearances. She would write home about going visiting in her "carriage and four" without revealing that it was merely a dray drawn by four bullocks.

But without the support and sense of belonging to a local community, women found it difficult to survive the harsh conditions and isolation of rural and remote areas.

Connecting with community or finding support from family or others who share similar beliefs can provide a sense of belonging and encouragement, as well as, giving opportunities for growth and learning. Turning to God for help, can give a renewed sense of hope when facing life's inevitable struggles.

The story of the prophet Jonah, in the Bible tells of God telling Jonah to go to Ninevah and tell the people to turn back to God, as their lives are disobeying Him. Jonah tries to go the opposite way, because he knows the people are big, mean and angry, but God knows and gets Jonah to Ninevah anyway. Jonah tells the people to turn back to God, and they listen. Jonah thinks they should still be punished, but God shows him that He is in control.

Bible stories are the best way to teach us about how God wants us to live. Jesus came to teach and show us how to live and love others. We are never alone at any time. His love is promised and holds us fast.

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES AND HUMANITARIAN WORKERS

October 8th is an important day for Red Cross. It marks the 60th Anniversary of the Fundamental Principles that guide the work of Red Cross. They allow us to build trust, gain safe access and help protect life, health and dignity. So we must ensure they are never compromised. They are: Humanity Neutrality; Independence; Unity; Voluntary Service and Universality.

2024 was the highest toll of aid workers being killed. So far, with 672 aid workers killed, 2025 is already shaping to be worse. Up until now the greatest risk was car accidents. Now it is drones, missiles and other weapons. These are people who will go where others will not, into conflict zones, disaster areas and communities in crisis. If they cannot operate safely, the consequences for millions of people caught in conflict will be devastating. From Gaza to Sudan, Ukraine to Myanmar humanitarian needs are surging. Each aid worker killed is an assault not just on a life but on our shared humanity. They are also violations of International Law.

In September, Australia's Foreign Minister, Penny Wong, alongside other leaders and Humanitarian Organisations, including Red Cross, announced the Declaration on the Protection of Humanitarian Personnel at the UN General Assembly. It is about keeping Aid Workers safe. However it will only matter if it is acted upon.

Have your say on Council's strategy for a thriving Shoalhaven economy

15 September 2025

Shoalhaven residents and businesses are invited to provide feedback to help inform Council's new Economic Development and Tourism Strategy 2035.

It is intended that this 10-year strategic document will provide a roadmap for how Council will support, attract and advocate for businesses in the region and capitalise on the opportunities of the visitor economy.

"This is an important opportunity for residents and businesses to discuss areas they believe Council can support sustainable growth of jobs and business in our region," said Mayor Patricia White.

"Council plays many roles in supporting the local and visitor economy. It is important that residents have their say to ensure we develop a strategy that reflects and supports our community's aspirations for our local economy into the future," Cr White said.

Once finalised, the new strategy will be a combined replacement for the existing, Economic Development Strategy 2017-2026 and Destination Management Plan 2018-2023, both of which are due for renewal.

The community can provide initial and early feedback by completing an online survey on Council's Get Involved website by Friday 24 October 2025.

Industry leaders and business representatives will also be invited to participate in a separate, business survey and attend targeted workshops to discuss Shoalhaven's economic development and tourism priorities.

Business owners and managers who wish to attend a workshop are requested to register by Friday 3rd October by emailing business@shoalhaven.nsw.gov.au.

The new strategy will support other key Council plans including the Community Strategic Plan 2032 and will provide direction for Council's annual Delivery Program Operational Plan (DPOP), Budget, and the setting of any fees and charges.



She is completing her initial Bush Fire training. One of the things that appeals to her is that within the RFS the training and development opportunities are diverse. There is the opportunity to gain qualifications which are vital and transferable to life generally.

Her Bush Fire advice is that preparation is key - not just a slogan. Don't wait until summer to think about bush fire safety. Have a clear, well-practised plan in place, and make sure your property is maintained and ready especially if you are more rural. Please adhere to and respect the fire bans and fire permit rules in place. Outside brigade life Mel works as a Practice Manager in Allied Health, She says it keeps her busy during the week but also let her stay connected to the Brigade and attend training sessions and contribute when she can.

In her downtime she enjoys spending time outdoors exploring more of our beautiful surroundings and time with family.

Please note all pile burns need a permit from the start of September until the end of the fire season, and these permits can be suspended if weather conditions are adverse. You must also give your neighbours 24 hours' notice and let the local brigade know a day ahead.

Forum Organises Urgent Fundraising for Berry Public School Appeal - When asked to assist with raising \$7,000 to fund expenses to send a team of amazing students to compete at the International Tournament of Minds in Sydney, the Forum Committee established a dedicated web page and newsletter and tapped into the amazing generosity of the Berry community.

The funds were raised within 24 hours..

Forum Meeting held on 16 October - 60 people attended the meeting on Thursday, including Mayor Patricia White, new CEO Andrew Constance and Councillors Selena Clancy and Matthew Norris. Many attendees have commented since the meeting that they felt the meeting content had been very informative and well run.

Mayor and CEO presentations - Mayor White provided updates on several areas, ranging from improving the schedule of mowing to the proposals received for three luxury hotels in the Vincentia and Huskisson areas. She also referred to the Office of Local Government changes to Council meetings that will be implemented in January.

CEO Andrew Constance spoke about the financial challenges faced by Council and how he would approach the role, emphasising the need for transparency, and encouraging investment in the Shoalhaven, whilst protecting the environment. He committed to attend future Forum meetings, when possible, to answer questions from Forum members.

Council Finances - Stuart Coughlan summarised Council's 2024/25 financial results compared to the 2026 Budget.

Berry Hotel DA - Stuart advised the Feros CEO had assumed all non-heritage issues were resolved at the Court hearing, but he was reminded that will need to be re-addressed with a new DA. Parking requirements for the Berry Hotel proposal are a major issue. Feros have proposed a total of 26 parking spaces for a pub capacity of 389 patrons compared to the 142 required based on their own survey results.

Rotary Dog Park - David Brawn showed the location of the dog park in Council's original plans and advised that Rotary will be holding a community fund-raising event on Sunday 16 November at the site of the dog park. Stage one is fencing of areas with an estimated cost of \$70,000.

General Business - A resident representing a group of neighbouring property owners, voiced concerns about an application (MA24/1411) to expand small cooking classes and lunches twice a week at 450B Coolangatta Road, to a restaurant operating 7-days a week 7am-11pm with three sittings of 60 people.

AGM - Laurie Watson provided a summary of the income and payments for 2024/25, which can be found on the Forum website.

No applications had been received for Committee membership in response to invitations included in the newsletter and the Town Crier. Eleven members of the Committee were reappointed.

In January of 2022, after a brief and one-sided conversation with cancer, our then chairperson, Jim Jefferis died, aged 72. Jim had been a member of Berry Landcare since 2008, vice-chair since 2014 and chair from 2016 onward.

In September of this year, his partner, Jill Farrar and Berry Landcare invited Jim's colleagues and fellow members to celebrate his life by planting a tree in Mark Radium Park. His tree joins an arcade of existing memorial trees which celebrate the founding mothers and fathers of the Landcare movement: Joan Kirner and Heather Mitchell, in Victoria1986, and Rick Farley, Philip Tyne, and Bob Hawke, for establishing the national movement in 1989. These memorial trees were planted in partnership with the Berry Alliance and Shoalhaven City Council with funds from the National Landcare Program through the Shoalhaven Landcare Association. Using skills honed during his professional life at IBM and as a financial institution CEO, Jim, as a volunteer, guided Berry Landcare through programs such as the Berry 'Bush Links' Corridor project, a half a million dollar project (2016–2023) funded by the NSW Environment Trust, the methods and objectives of which continue to motivate the group's activities.

After Jim's retirement, Jim and Jill opted for life in Broughton Vale. The first local species they learnt to identify was the Red Ash, Alphitonia excelsa, and appropriately this is the identity of his memorial tree. The plant was wild-sewn in a local and privately owned regenerating forest and selected for transplanting into the park as a memorial tree. No longer competing in a forest for sunlight and space, it is now pitted against park vandals and overzealous whipper snipperers. The members of the Mark Radium Parkcare group will continue to keep a watchful eye on our memoriam.

REPLACEMENT PLANTS FOR WEEDY PRIVET SPECIES

Spring blossom is all around us and a walk along any country lane is a great place to start for identifying our local native trees as well as some of our major weed species, specifically privets.

Small leafed privet - Ligustrum sinensis is a large shrub and matures and flowers at an early stage. The flowers have a distinctive odour. Even when only 1 metre tall, shrubs produce a prolific number of fruits that are eaten and spread by birds into gardens and bush where they will germinate easily.

Replacement plant - Breynia oblongifolia - Little breynia







Little breynia

Broad leafed Privet - Ligustrum lucidum becomes a large tree and has the capacity to spread and grow in gardens and bushland.

Both privet species grow rapidly and become invasive, suppressing and outcompeting native vegetation by reducing water, nutrients and light.

Replacement plant - Backhousia myrtifolia - Grey myrtle









Grey myrtle grows in full sun or semishade, as a bushy dense shrub. very suitable as a screening plant to provide protective habitat for small birds.

Plenty of water, mulch and native fertilizer will overcome the tendency to slow growth in the early stages. It is drought hardy when mature.

Privet thrives in a climate like Berry and because of the invasive characteristics, both small and large leafed privet need to be managed and controlled.

Breynia and Grey myrtle could be mistaken for privets, so, if in doubt, don't pull out.

Feedback on Berry flood investigation to inform next steps the city Council

Residents in the township of Berry and its surrounds are invited to view a recent flood study of the area to learn more about their flood risk and inform how it will be managed in the future.

The technical investigation was undertaken by Council to improve its understanding of flood behaviour within the Broughton Creek catchment, which encompasses Berry and its surrounds.

Mayor Patricia White said the study took into consideration land use changes, ongoing urban development and infrastructure upgrades, and the findings may be used to inform future flood risk management strategies.

"It was necessary to undertake this investigation as there have been significant changes to the landscape in the catchment area due in part to new infrastructure and residential developments which can impact flood behaviour," Cr White said.

"In April 2024, residents in the Berry area experienced the most severe flood on record, making the findings of this study and the way we use that information, even more pertinent," she said.

"I'd strongly encourage residents to view the study's findings and have your say about how the findings of the study should be used by Council to inform management of flood risk in the area," she said.

The study is now on public exhibition until Sunday 9 November and the community is invited to view the documents to better understand their flood risk.

Residents also have the opportunity to provide feedback about what steps they would like Council to take to help manage the flood risk by completing an online survey. As part of this consultation, Council is interested in hearing whether the community would like to pursue the implementation a Flood Warning System for the Berry area, particularly following significant flooding in the area in April 2024.

A community information drop-in session will be held at the Berry School of Arts on Wednesday 29 October from 3pm to 6.30pm for residents who would like more information about the study and how their feedback will be used.



The Broughton Creek Flood Study found the primary source of flooding in the area was due to several major creek systems within the catchment, particularly within urbanised areas of Berry and the locality of Bundewallah.

The study identified that these areas were also prone to flash flooding, when heavy rainfall occurred over a short period of time.

The Broughton Creek Flood Study was undertaken in accordance with the NSW Flood Prone Land Policy, the NSW Flood Risk Management Manual (2023) and in close collaboration with the NSW State Emergency Service (SES) and the NSW Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW).





Council works with industry to improve DA assessment times

16 October 2025

Organisations and individuals lodging development proposals with Council are being reminded to include all required documentation to ensure timely assessment under NSW Government timeframes.

Under the Ministerial Statement of Expectations Order, Shoalhaven Council is required to assess development applications (DAs) within 105 calendar days following lodgement.

Mayor Patricia White said while Council is well positioned to meet the new target, the ability of staff to finalise assessments also hinges on applications being lodged with all the necessary supporting material. "Council is continuing to work closely with applicants to ensure all required documentation is submitted to help ensure staff are able to assess proposals efficiently and within the timeframes set by the NSW Government," Cr White said.

"By working with industry to improve the quality and completeness meaningfully to the delivery of new homes across the city," she said.

of applications, Council's performance targets can be met, and vital infrastructure funding will be unlocked, ensuring we can contribute "As we enter this new phase of planning reform, it's important that we all adapt to the evolving expectations set by the NSW Government to During the 2024-25 financial year, Council successfully achieved the NSW Government's previous target of 110 calendar days for DA assessment times.

The Department of Planning's league table also shows that in 2024-25 Shoalhaven Council received 929 DAs, putting Council in the top 10 for the number of applications lodged.

The result ensures Council is eligible for a share of \$67 million in grant funding under round one of the Faster Assessments Incentive Program, to deliver local infrastructure such as roads, open spaces, and community facilities.

Eligible councils will be scored and ranked based on their average assessment timeframes in 2024–25 and their improvement against their average over the previous three years.

The NSW Government is due to announce the successful councils to receive funding, this month.

Successful councils will be contacted by the Department of Planning following completion of the assessment process and asked to nominate an eligible local infrastructure project.




